

Human Relations Official Succumbs

CHARLOTTE, N.C.—(UPI)—Harry S. Jones, the executive secretary of the N. C. Council on Human Relations, died at his home here Monday of a heart attack. He was 59.

Mr. Jones had worked in North Carolina since 1954 for the interracial organization which devoted its efforts to human understanding between Negroes and whites.

He was an ordained minister in the Unisitede rbp r-ster in the United Presbyterian Church, USA, and a member of the Catawba Synod.

Churchmen Told Of The Nation's 'New Negro..'

CHICAGO — (UPI) — A keynote address to the five-day Methodist conference which is seeking ways to integrate white and Negro units of the church and is drawing guidelines for racially connected community problems.

THE REV. MARTIN Luther King Jr., head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, addressed the Methodists Friday.

Bishop Ensley said there is a "new Negro" and a "new conscience" in the world. Both must be met, he said, by "crawling under your neighbor's skin and experiencing the world as he does."

"I WONDER HOW many of us appreciate in the most remote way the aspiration of the colored people of the world for the advantages that we take for granted," he said.

Equality is a "mathematical category which does not truly apply to human qualities," Bishop Ensley said. "I sometimes wish we could superannuate this notion of equality, for it is the silent partner of so much of our prejudice."

DR. W. ASTOR Kirk, a Negro Methodist from Washington, D.C., said most representatives are optimistic about the conference and are prepared to absorb the Negro portion of the church into the denomination's five geographical units.

Dr. Kirk said when a Methodist may join the church of his choice, "then we will have gone about as far as we can go."

The conference is not legislative, but its decisions are expected to influence proposals placed before the Methodist quadrennial conference next year.

Johnson Wins In Mississippi Race

JACKSON, Miss.—(UPI)—Lt. Gov. Paul Burney Johnson Jr., the defiant segregationist won Tuesday's Democratic primary runoff for governor over former Gov. J. P. Coleman. Gov. Ross Barnett called it "an endorsement of states rights, constitutional government and segregation of the races."

Johnson, 47, lost three earlier races for governor, but in this campaign he capitalized on the University crisis and opposition to the Kennedy administration to sweep the state with the exception of a few counties in Coleman's native northeast.

Mr. Bennett, the first Negro ever appointed to the panel, is a Durham, N. C., life insurance executive.

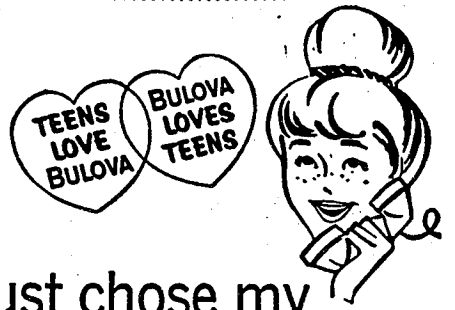

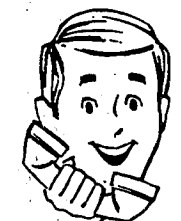
