Rights Lawyer Gets Bond On

BALTIMORE, Md. - After a whirlwind campaign of exactly one week, Herman Taylor, noted Raleigh, N. C., civil rights lawyer jailed for probation violation on income tax charges, was released on bond.

The U. S. Court of Appeals, Fourth Circuit, set bond at \$1500, while defense Attorney Len Holt of Norfolk, Va., processes an appeal of the revocation of proba-

Holt said it is one of the few times in the history of American jurisprudence that bond has been granted in a probation violation

He said that in his intensive week's effort to free Taylor he had the support of the Committee to Assist Southern Lawyer of National Lawyer Guild and of the Southern Conference Educational Fund, on whose legal committee he serves, the assistance of numerous lawyers and individuals in Detroit, Lynchburg, Va., helped with research, paid expenses, picked up the telephone bill, or fed and housed me on my travels."

Removed From Welfare Rolls

ATLANTA, Ga. - Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, has issued a nationwide appeal for staple goods for starving Negroes in the Mississippi Delta.

Dr. King said SCLC board member Dr. Aaron Henry estimates that 22,000 people have been removed from welfare rolls because of intensified civil rights and voter registration efforts in LaFlore and Madison counties. Some of the more active participants have also been forced to leave their homes on plantations.

Urging people throughout America to respond freely, Dr. King said, "I am calling on supporters North, South, East and West to gather staple goods in their communities through their churches to be sent to the Council of Federated Organizations (COFO), care of Dr. Aaron Henry 220 4th Street, Clarksdale, Miss.



Ably fielding barbed and penatrating questions, Mr. Wilkins, in answer to the question-"Don't you think school integration is being pushed to the point of absurdity?" - said: "Absolutely not. Statistics show that since the 1954 U. S. Supreme Court decision to cease discriminatory practices in public school systems, only one percent total school integration has been effected. This," he stated, emphatically, "is the point of absurdity."

Mr. Wilkins further explained that 'token integration' is no longer acceptable to the new Negro.

"The new Negro knows that an inch, no matter how highly touted, is nothing more than an inch. The new Negro can now differentiate between a baby step and a bounding leap, and above all, the new Negro realizes that he still has miles to travel to reach the full equality to which he is entitled under the provisions of the United States Constitution."
