Whites Must Be Candid and Courageous In Facing Racial Problems, Birmingham Newspaper Official Is Told.

FLORENCE, Ala., Mar. 29.—(ANP)—Southerners are vitally interested in the racial problems with which they are confronted and they should be candid and courageous in approaching them, Judge Charles N. Feidelson, associate editor of The Birmingham Age-Herald, said in an address at Florence State Teachers College, reported by The Birmingham

The war between the states he said, "left its major taint upon the majority; we are constantly shadowed by a dark presence; our psychology is colored by what we call

the Negro question. So many things of life are shaped by the presence of this alien race. The right, the wise, the civilized solution, amelioration and adjustment of this problem is of incalculable importance to

ice to the Negro.

"The Negro is in this country because he was brought here as a slave by New Englanders—not because he sought to make his bome here. Economic pressure made him a problem in the South.

"With his freedom the Negro, unlike the serf of the Old World, was afloat, untrained,b ut endowed with civil rights he was not qualified to handle.

"When the Negro was freed the

"But," he added, "the Negro is building for himself a racial integrity and we should be prepared to face as realities this question of his pocition among us.

"Lynching," he said, "denies eve mandate of civilization. It is a resort to savagery; a return to the primitive; ethically, legally there is
