implies the Court to give further time for the argument on the Demurser, but the Court said in substance: "I cannot say anything for you to look up or get prepared in as this case is perfectly plain to me, and the statute is also plain, so much so that I can't say why the City is asking for this." He quoted the law as he understood and said that it was a sound doctrine and that he could not see why the City would continue one minute that it was not liable unless it is for the purpose of delay, and the Court read Section 3 of the Statute of the "Act to Suppress Mob Violence."

In his opinion, the presiding

judge upheld the act and said it was good.

The Court further said: "I have very little patience for your contention that the statute would make it impossible for a recovery where damages were done to personal property by a mob aid at the same time refuse to protect human life, and property."

The no-nonsense judge of the Chicago bar, the intent of the law was to put a stop to this kind of violence; the purpose was to make the City and the tax-payers responsible for the outrages perpetrated by unreasonable and inhuman mobs and lynchings. Unless some action is taken by the highest Government in the land to meet the situation, it is certain that it will soon be dangerous for persons to walk along the streets. Such a condition must be abated and in order that the law might be enforced it is necessary to compel the City, which they fail to do their duty in the protection of life and property, to respond in damages as a penalty for their negligence, thus bringing it home to every

To Fight the Battles of All Workers, Regardless of Color, Race or Creed.

The following is submitted in support of the principles and principles of the Stock Yards Labor Council:

First.—That the economic status of the Wage Earners is far from what it should be.

Second.—That the Wage Earners themselves must take up the solution of the way they would be benefited substantially.

Third.—That the standards of life of the colored men are not equal to that of the white men.

Fourth.—That the two races when brought in contact in the field of industry should co-operate understandingly to attain the desired ends.

Fifth.—That less occasion for trouble between the races would exist if each had a better understanding of the struggles of the other and much more understanding between the colored and the white men.

Sixth.—That no great gain can be obtained by any group of workers apart from, and independent of the other similar groups, hence the belief that all workers regardless of race, language or creed should become factors in the movement.

CONSTRUCTIVE JOURNALISM

The newspapers are truly the mouthpieces of the races, groups, classes and classes. They are the mediums of affairs of happenings, current sentiments. They herald the affairs of the people. It is a matter of common knowledge that newspapers are the sources of more liberal educations than all of the universities combined.

We have in our race only about 7,500 college graduates. We have uncounted educated individuals upon whom the world has fixed its O. K. These individuals have been lettered and tutored by books, periodicals, magazines and newspapers. The newspaper occupies a unique and indispensable position among these people. Omnipotent and decay, ideas become rusty, history drives and guides the race. The newspapers do not carry their duties and responsibilities well. They do not serve the race.

THIS RACE OF ALLIES IS NOW AT THE CROSS ROADS: "THE DESTINY THAT WILL SHAKE OUT ENDS," IS BEFORE US. IF THE RACE IS TO TRAVEL ALONG THE ROAD OF CONSTRUCTIVE AND PROGRESSIVE EVOLUTION, THE VOICE OF THE NEWSPAPER MUST DIRECT THE PILGRIMAGE, MARSHALL THE VANGUARD AND KEEP THE PEOPLE INFORMED ON THE ISSUES THAT CONCERN THEM VITALLY. NOW IS THE TIME FOR THE NEWSPAPERS TO SEIZE WITH INTELLIGENT UNDERSTANDING AND SERIOUS CONCERN THE VITAL ISSUES OF THE DAY.

In 1865 there were only two colored newspapers, only one of these is now being published, THE CHRISTIAN RECORDER. Never-the-less, we have now 472 newspapers and periodicals, classified as follows: Religious, 76; School periodicals, 85; Organs of Associations, and Magazines, 35; Newspapers, 222. WITH 12 MILLIONS OF PEOPLE WITHIN OUR RACE, IT WORKS OUT THAT WE HAVE ONLY ONE PUBLICATION FOR EVERY 25,000. MAKING A FIFTY PERCENT DEDUCTION FOR ILLITERACY, WE FIND THAT WE HAVE ONLY ONE PUBLICATION FOR EVERY 12,500 READERS.

This appalling state of facts proves to every open thinker that every colored newspaper should be a medium of high intelligence with diffused information on all matters that concern the race.

The newspapers of our race are being held under constant and continual scrutiny by the Government officials. They are ardently and assiduously read by both race haters and race friends, and the unbiased white man or foreigner is compelled to appraise the race values according to the intrinsic merit of race periodicals. These race papers are sent all over the world, and place before the judgement of myriads of people. THEREFORE IT IS ENCUMBERED UPON ALL EDITORS TO DISSOLVE ALL COMPROMISE THAT HAVE SUBSIDIZED THEIR PUBLICATION. It is further encumbered upon them to sever all quasi-political connections and questionable financial relationships. It behoves all editors to consider all issues that effect the race only after intelligent research and fact finding has been made. It is regrettable that some of our papers are made the object of ridicule and disgust; it is regrettable that some of our papers have no editorials and no opinions on current race issues; it is regrettable that some of our papers have collected a lot of junk and handed it broadcast to the world.

It is regrettable that ignorance lurks behind the trenchant pen of a large degree of our editors. It grieves us to realize use and ink thought; it grieves us that some of our editors have not cut out and avoided important questions because they were paid to "say off". It is disgusting to us to discover that men have ventured into the newspaper world with base ignorance and without fundamental knowledge of their huge task.

Pain, grief and disgust will not change this condition of affairs. It will take the infusion of new courage, a broader vision, healthier thinking and more intelligent editors in order to make our newspapers truly constructive.

Cassius King

ARTICLE IV.

Cassius King is without dispute the oldest living settler in Chicago with the colored race, he was born on the Northwest corner of Madison and Wells Street, (Formerly 1st Ave. and Madison) at the time of his birth in 1848, that information was communicated to me by Sabrina of King and the houses consisted of a number of small frame shacks. He is the son of H. D. and Dina King, his father was a native of Washington D. C., his brothers' birthplace was given as the State of Tennessee. For many years his father followed the mercantile interests of his day, and was considered to be a very clever student of human nature, so he utilized this gift to good advantage in connection with his management of various clubs. He was managing at the "Old Jones School" which was situated at the Northwest corner of Clark and Harrison Streets, on the side now occupied by the Rand McNally & Co. building, after the school closed Mr. King, gives the following reminiscence:

"The Southwest corner of Harrison and Clark Street was occupied by a grist mill owned, and operated by a colored man by name of Henry W. Wagner, who specialized

in the making of flour, and was identified with the Club business and until recent years I made the management of club life my work.

Stewart under John Shaw, who was steward of the Illinois Club, his assistant, Shaw later recommended him for the stewardship of the Lincoln, LaSalle, Sheridan, and Menokin Clubs. I always made it a practice to give my employees the best of opportunities, and it is safe to say only competent men for the different departments and treated them with the consideration due an honest employee. When I entered the business I knew very little about decoration of tables and etc., but I selected men for my staff that knew the business from end to end. Many of my former employees are still with me, and in the majority of cases they are still with me.

Mr. King, however, is the only one that impressed itself most upon my boyish mind and was that there was in addressing the club steward always addressed him as "Mr. King." I later found that this was prompted by the great esteem in which the individual was held for he never allowed his position to make him become unduly familiar with those whom he came in contact with.

Cassius King is still active and is president of one of our busy dozen stores located near the corner of Monroe and Clark Street. The contact I had with him in the early days of my manhood has served me in great stead as many small favors gained by me were done as thru giving the principles of Mr. Cassius King.

NEW PARTY TO PROTECT RIGHTS AND FREEDOM OF AMERICANS

Labor union circles are discussing the use of the general strike as a protest against the expulsion of the five Socialists, if the New York Assembly is idiotic enough to go that far.

The politicians who hatched this scheme upon the right of representation certainly have small brains and small loyalty to the Constitution of the United States and to our American spirit and institutions. Still, a strike is not the way to correct this wrong.

The way to correct is to start a new party, a Constitutional party, a party that believes in American institutions, that respects the law that respects the Declaration of Independence and the guarantees of this Constitution.

That stands honestly and sincerely for liberty and democracy, the thing we fought for abroad and are endeavoring to destroy here at home.

A party which is opposed to revolution — to either the revolution of radicalism or the revolution of reaction.

A party which is not willing to deliver the government into the hands of extremists of poverty and ignorance of wealth and selfishness;

A party which believes in conserving the necessities and the high purpose, the planks and policies, the Americans and methods, the republican form and democratic fundamentals which have made this country the greatest country in the world, the most prosperous country in the world, the freest country in the world, until the ranting reds of radicalism and the scoundrels of communism of wealth and privilege started out to undermine our government and destroy our democracy, each class with its batch of stupid, selfish, ignoramus.

Or that the members of the community of wealth and privilege are the most powerful and because their lawlessness needs less belligerence in nearly every other class.

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HANGS HIGH WITH MACHINE GUNS

GOV. EDWARD P. MORROW, OF LEXINGTON, KY., PUT TO FLIGHT LYINCHING POSSE AT THE COST OF 6 LIVES.

Apparently Lexington, Ky., is as blind as any Southern City is usually quiet soon after a Lynching Bee. But this time the "Bees" did not accomplish its aim and as result of the effort five white men are dead and one colored woman. Very unusual result will put out to the public that it happened on February 9th that happened on February 9th that six Lynchers were killed and 14 injured seriously and a number of others received minor injuries when State Troops turned a machine gun on a mob which had attempted to storm the Court House to reach Willard Lockett, colored, confessed slayer of 10 year old Geneva Palmer, following his conviction and sentence to execution. Martial law has been declared.

The mob composed of white men breached the Courthouse with a rope. They were warned away by Cap. L. V. Crockett, in command of the State Troops, who told them of the conviction of the slayer. They refused to heed the warning and continued to advance.

When they were within a few yards of the Court House door, Captain of the Constabulary, Mr. Beni F. Carrier, Lexington, John Thomas, Vernallies, L. M. King, Lexington, J. M. Rodger, Lexington, William Elthington, Vernallies and one colored woman fell dead.

Fifteen persons were injured seriously; that some of them will die.

Eighty-four shots were slightly wounded.

From the court house windows came a volley of shots down on the mob who then withdrew.

on the streets they started breaking into shops and stores to get fire arms.

TAKES PLenty OF OTHERS WITH HIM

Special To The Whip

Pine Bluff, Ark., Feb. 10th.—This fight for about two hours was a scene of battle and bloodshed. What added to the intense nature of the combat was the fact that the battle came from an unexpected source. George Vights, a highly respected colored citizen residing in an unoccupied and uncalled-for house, was shot by a white father. 

Stock Yards Labor Council and The Colored Workers

Some months ago there appeared in this paper an article:

Where Do We Go From Here? In that we analyzed the industrial situation facing the American Negro to day. We did not endorse any national labor organization as being the salvation of the Negro worker. After extensive research we found that the Negro worker was in an anomalous position. He is suffering from the iron heel of capitalism. He is undergoing excommunicating agonies as a result of the prejudices in the ranks of labor. Despite all these obstacles, that stand as almost insurmountable barriers, we did say that his salvation was in organization.

This is a day of organization. The period of individual success and accomplishment has passed. A glance at the gigantic enterprises that have grown up over night as the result of intelligent combination makes this fact too obvious to warrant elaboration. The Negro must organize if he expects to go forward. He must get together if he expects to demand an equal place in the affairs of the future.

He has more in common with organized labor despite its fancies than he has with capital. Therefore his future affiliations should be with labor whose interests are common with his.

In Chicago more of our group are employed in the Stock Yards than in any of the industries. The Stock Yards Labor Council according to the NEW MAJORITY, the official organ of the Chicago Branch of the A. F. of L. has been largely responsible for the increase in wages and the decrease in hours and a general improvement in working condition in the yards. The Amalgamated Meat Cutters and Butcher Workmen's Union has organized a District Council. According to law, they have the authority, according to good judgement, it destroys the chances of the progress of the worker's cause.

We trust that labor will soon bridge this chasm which deteriorates its strength. We hope that the colored workers will not get "cold feet" on account of this controversy but will continue to support the Stock Yards Labor Council which has worked overtime for their interests.

Johnstone and others of the labor movement should not become disheartened at their scepticism of some colored men. Past experiences with the labor movement do not give them sufficient cause.

Yet at the same time, there are ample numbers and intelligence among themselves, represented in this particular industry not only to ask for but to force a square deal in the future.


