Walter White Says Past's Blind Faith in Either Major Party Was Lacking, While Inept Tactics of Wallace Aids Only Stirred Resentment

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KANSAS CITY, Mo. Some of us who are reasonably close to the thinking minorities, especially of the 14,000,000 American Negroes, have seen some interest-

especially of the 14,000,000 American Negroes, have seen some interest-ing and possibly significant events recently. More than 1,000 dele-gates, alternates and plain garden² variety of members of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People were holding their thirty-ninth annual con-ference. From 8:30 a. m. until midnight they had been in almost continuous session with only brief interludes for food and rest. Kan-sas City's genial Chief of Police Johnson, newspaper reporters and Johnson, newspaper reporters and other experienced observers told me they had never before seen so earnest and hard-working a con-vention in this convention-ridden city

Americans who understandably enough believe from the headlines that the white South is in flaming revolt against proposals to do away with lynching, disfranchise-ment and racial segregation would have had their eyes opened at the number of thoughtful, hard-working white Southern delegates. There were not only university professors and students but a white stationary engineer from Arkansas and trade unionists. a from They were neither starry-eyed idealists nor Communists but honest, practical Americans who dare to flout the fomenters of racial hate in their home com-munities and to advocate full equality for all men whatever their thin color skin color.

No Republican Sentiment

Perhaps most significant of all the changes which the last few years have wrought is the almost total absence of any pro-Republi-can sentiment among the dele-gates who represented the most informed and thoughtful ladar gates who represented the most informed and thoughtful leader-ship of 500 cities and towns in all parts of the country. The simultaneous Republican conven-tion at Philadelphia was followed by the delegates through press and radio but with an objectivity bordering on apathy. Whatever candidates were chosen or plat-form planks adopted seemed to be form planks adopted seemed to be considered as just another quad-rennial performance by the trained seals of politics with another per-formance scheduled to be given a fortnight later. Republican Twee-dledum and Democratic Tweedledee were doing their stunts, and the difference of intent between the difference of intent between them was indistinguishable to the N. A. A. C. P. delegates. There was manifest in every speech and throughout the resolutions the realization that the only way to achieve results is through complete independence of either political party, with emphasis on spe-cific issues thd individual candidates

So inept were the tactics of some of the Wallaceites that resentment among the delegates swiftly developed. The sentiment swiftly developed. The short shrift ac-corded the Wallace supporters corded the wanace supporters stopped cold any attempts by any other politicians of other parties which may have been planned. pendent and potent, has come into being, and the Kansas City meet-ings clearly demonstrated that ings clearly demonstrated that unique development. If it be true that next November's election is to be determined by a margin narrower than that which seemed likely a few weeks ago, it is well within the range of possibilities that the racial group which has just concluded its sessions here in Kansas City may materially de-Kansas City may termine the result. materially de-
