WOOLWORTH'S MAMMY MEMO

A WOOLWORTH IDEA OF THE 1941 AMERICAN NEGRO?

We happened to be passing by the F. W. Woolworth 5 and 10 cent store at 1421 Gratiot on our way to do a news job. And, behold, what did we see? A picture of a Black Mammy, grinning, in a red shirt-waist with a yellow bandanna around her head and a yellow kerchief around her neck.

It is a pity that these enlightened business institutions which, even though interested in sales for the company, are so brazen in their embarrassing interpretation of the race.

Such unfair delineations place a blight upon the Negro that will have to be overcome each time something happens.

WE STRONGLY PROTEST: BECAUSE WE ARE RIGHT

Those black mammys ought to be taken out of those windows right away. No Negro has any business buying them. They are not a compliment to anybody's kitchen. They are a disgrace.

This kitchen scheme, though perhaps sold with no intentional slam, is nothing more than a Grand Slam. Turn the situation right about face. No other race would dare display such a thing. It isn't even funny.

THE NEGRO MAMMY IS DEAD WITH THE PAST!

This grinning, chestnut-colored cardboard creation in the Woolworth store, and we assume it is sold in all Woolworth stores hereabouts, is figuratively saying to the public: "I'm in town, honey. Does you want a broom?"

Years ago the Black Mammy died. History has never given credit to the real woman, who, in thousands of plantation kitchens and parlors, did have a great deal to do with management, advice and the progress of a family.

A BETTER WAY OUT: BEAUTY FOR UGLINESS

Wouldn't it have been much better to have the likeness of some presentable Negro woman on those things, if a Negro just makes use? The Negro likes to have his better side presented. And, as I have always contended, plans for advertising or salesmanship on anything that has to do with race ought to be carefully considered.

This woman is grinning, I say, with a large, over-acted mouth. She stands, hefty, big, grinning. The idea simply doesn't click.

PLASTIC PIGNACY VS. REALISTIC REVELATION

Just a little slip up like this can turn history back. I am strongly opposed to any race's being painted up in those aspects which approach the burlesque, the funny, the simple. One member of another race can look at one of those things and decide, in his heart, that all Negroes are of the same sort. He can transfer that thought to hundreds of others. They begin thinking the same thing.

The Negro has been ignored in history because there have been those prejudiced historians who have resorted to painting us as Africans, devoid of any sense of morality, with spiked noses, sawed-off teeth, and in breech cloths.
